1. Minister's Letter



Dear Friends,

How wonderful to be able to read about the work of All Saints when we are still in lockdown! It reminds us, as if we need reminding, that the church is not shut, but very much alive. To say "Thank you" to all who lead, take part, do the less obvious but still vital things that make All Saints all that it is, is never enough. 'All Saints' is a very good name for our church because the more I read of this report, indeed the more I look

around me at the life, mission and ministry of this church I find saints. I find people faithfully playing their part whether by prayer or activity, leading or taking part. I find people offering what they can to the glory of God and the service of others. We are a church richly blessed with gifts and talents and this is an opportunity to celebrate them all.

As I write, we are experiencing church differently. Some are joining the Circuit on Sundays for worship via Zoom, while others are receiving worship material at home. Various people across the Circuit are writing reflections which are being shared. Pastoral Visitors and Pastoral work continues, albeit by phone, Zoom, text, WhatsApp and other means. In a time when 'Social Distancing' is being encouraged and enforced we, like many, are proving that keeping our physical distance has not hindered our social togetherness. Indeed, the lack of our usual gathering has in some cases deepened our friendships.

It has been a great encouragement to me to hear numerous stories about how God has been more visible, or there has been a greater awareness of God because we are not as frenetically busy as normal. Perhaps this poses a real challenge to how we decide to live post lockdown. Indeed, this lockdown is giving us a chance to hear God and be challenged by God when we would normally crowd him out due to our busyness.

It is fascinating to recall many of the biblical stories that we tell in one easy sitting but actually took days if not years to be lived out. We often say 'God's timing is very different to ours', well yes it is. God always gave his people time to prepare, time to change, time to realise what he was asking of them. Now could be one of those times.

All Saints, as ever, is exceptional in its attention to detail and we can have great confidence in our governance. There are always many people willing to help, but we do need some to hold office in the life of the church. Currently, we are looking for a Lead Treasurer, Worship and Leadership Stewards as well as a new Chair of Property Action. The reason that these posts need filling is because we have to honour the decisions of those who have served for some time but now, for a variety of reasons, need to be step down. Ecclesiastes chapter three is often quoted, 'there is a season for everything under heaven', now may be the time for some to stand down and for others to step up. We need this to be a prayerful process, but one that does not mean we leave people hanging. If you haven't already, do pray about these positions, that God will direct the right people to the right role. There will always be support offered at All Saints and I look forward to being able to appoint people to these positions by the time the Annual Meeting does actually meet. Do speak to me or a steward or those who currently hold the roles to find out what is required.

This report gives us confidence in what God has called us to in past years, just as it points to some of what God has in store for the years to come. I commend this report to you and in so doing ask that you pray for God's leading as we look ahead.

3. Church Stewards

3.1 All Saints Administrator

Eluned Hallas took up her position as Administrator on 1st February for a six month period. Since then she has been producing the weekly "All Saints Notices" and other individual notices as needed; taken over the production

and maintenance of the duty rota; also contacting preachers/musicians/readers each week to set up services; and creating PowerPoint slide sequences as required for Morning and Evening Worship, using the Preachers' Orders of Service.

3.2 The recruitment of Church Stewards

Following the appointment of an administrator, and the consequent reduction in Stewards' work load, and the need to increase the number of stewards, job descriptions for Leadership Stewards and Worship Stewards have been drawn up and publicised within the All Saints membership.

3.3 Safer recruiting Policy and Practice

This was also discussed in line with Circuit Safeguarding Policy and with regard to recruitment of church officers.

3.4 Safeguarding

The current position for best practice was reviewed, including Risk Assessments for Church User Groups.

3.5 GDPR.

A paper will be presented to the March Church Council concerning the holding of personal data for "legitimate interest".

3.6 Messy Church

The last Meeting of Messy Church was held on 8th February 2020 and it included a celebratory element to mark and give thanks for ten years of Christian fun and worship for a large number of children and adults.

3.7 Church Music

The current small pool of organists and pianists who play for Services was discussed and a demonstration and trial use of a digital hymn player was arranged. A report together with a recommendation will be presented to the March Church Council.

Postscript

Shortly after this report for Church Council was completed, the Covid19 Lockdown was declared, and all meetings were cancelled until further notice. The Report should also be suitable for the Annual Church Meeting.

4. Church Council

a) Mission Statement

b) Report

The Church Council has met twice since the last Annual Church Meeting; in October, January. These meetings were chaired by Rev. Ian Griffiths. In January an Open meeting was held to discuss the churches response to the Marriage and Relationship porposals. This meeting was well attended with written contributions from several mid week groups submitted. The April meeting was postponed due to social distancing but paperwork was duly mailed out and voting on proposals conducted and counted via email to enable certain necessary tasks to move forwards in a timely manner.

As well as the reports from All Saints Church committees and action groups, we noted the continued use of the hall by our uniformed organisations especially as the Scouting group has expanded and is now running two groups.

We have been informed that the fire safety has been inspected and passed by the fire officer. The new toilets work has been completed and in use!

Safeguarding of children and other vulnerable adults on our church premises has been kept under consideration and follows the guidelines given by the Circuit. Creating Safer Spaces and First Aid training has been held for those who needed it.

We are legally bound to state again that the major risks to which our church is exposed as identified by the Church Council as trustees have been reviewed and systems established to mitigate the risks.

5. REPORT- DIACONAL MINISTRY – WANTAGE AND ABINGDON CIRCUIT – MAY 2020



Dear Friends,

Once again it has been a very full year, and as I write this during the lock-down I reflect that sometimes I do too much, but the sheer variety of things that I am called to, brings me life and great joy so I am definitely not complaining!

WORSHIP

This year marks the change in the Methodist constitution where deacons are officially recognized as preachers in their own right, but I have been gifted plenty of services amongst you all including Parade services at All Saints which are always a great delight to me! I continue to lead to baptism services at Trinity on the first Sunday of the month which are always all age services. These services take a lot of planning, but I hope and pray, that they speak into the hearts of those who come into a church, often for the first time. We developed a welcome card to enable visitors to feel at home in church and are monitoring the usefulness of them.

I also helped out with the World Day of Prayer service at Trinity this year which was a huge privilege as we prayed for the people of Zimbabwe.

I have also taken several marriage services, and sadly some funerals too. In 2019, I was awarded my Licentiate from the Society of Bereavement Practitioners, which holds me to keep to a set of standards in bereavement care, and I have been asked to provide some sessions to a local community group, on death and dying, later in the year.

It was a privilege to plan and lead the reflective service for the 60th anniversary of All Saints church and to be immersed in the weekend of celebration- the weekend was a really joyous time!

CHRISTMAS 2019

Nativity at All Saints with Rush Common Preschool- it was a delight to be asked to lead this and the children and staff did themselves so proud! A BIG thank you to Jan, Kate and Chris for supporting this! Blue Christmas at Trinity- whilst well advertised, the attendance was low, but those who came appreciated the space to reflect on the Christmas Story without the worldly pressures of Christmas encroaching upon the space.



Christingle family service at Trinity- I think we had just over 120 people to this service. We certainly ran out of Christingles and we know we prepared over 60 of them for children, plus many glow sticks!

I was most appreciative of the opportunity to plan the Carol service at All Saints church.

MESSY CHURCH

Thank you to the Messy Church team for inviting me to lead the worship at various times. It has been a wonderful experience sharing the word of God in this setting and I am sad that it has finished.

TODDLER GROUP

It has been another busy year at Toddler group, where we have around 120 on the books. My thanks always goes to the extensive team, without whom we could not function. Focusing upon the building of an intentional community, through the building of a register, has enabled a more static community to evolve, where firm friendships have been easier to establish. It is always a great privilege to be able to offer to parents, a space to talk over their concerns. We are always looking for people to join the team on a rotational basis- to be alongside our families, once or twice a term, to serve refreshments, to hold a baby, or to sit and listen. If you think that person might be you, we would be delighted to hear from you!

At Christmas time, my friend Claire from Tunbridge Wells, brought her puppet family to tell us the story of the first Christmas- (photos above) and we had a visit from Father Christmas himself too! Here are just some of our "annonymous" starry children, receiveing gifts from him!

Sadly we could not do Donkey's first Easter this year, due to the lock down. We continue to pass on information to parents on our social media page which anyone can access.

SCHOOLS WORK ABINGDON

My ministry in schools consists of weekly visits into a primary school. I provide sessions for children in groups of about 5. These may be children who need some extra pastoral input. I am accountable to inclusion manager/ teacher /safeguarding leads. These sessions are designed to equip children to be more emotionally robust – for some this is a long on-going piece of work and providing stability of provision is important.

The sessions always involve an activity, either making something or playing a game designed for emotional literacy and there is ALWAYS space for each child to talk and express how they are feeling. It is a huge privilege to be welcomed into the school and I have recently been invited on to the governing body.

FURTHERING EMOTIONAL LITERACY- SOME EXAMPLES

Helping children to understand the physical feelings we have when we exhibit our emotions – use of social stories- offering them new vocabulary to describe how they feel Using affirming language with one another

Practicing techniques to calm after feeling angry or afraid

Peer support and self- awareness is encouraged, and asking questions such as "what can I do to help my friend?" are encouraged and offer self-esteem

I always offer some sessions on the "Rights of the Child," which they find illuminating.

AN EXAMPLE OF AN ACTIVITY:

CHRISTMAS CRACKER MAKING - "getting through the holidays"

a peg doll which they decorated to remind them to always speak to a safe adult when they are worried

a star to remind them that they are all superstars

a novelty rubber to remind them we all make mistakes and we can learn from them a medal because as one child pointed out "we are all winners because we tried" (VERY IMPORTANT POINT!)

a pot of bubbles so they can visualize any bad memory or worry going inside the bubble and they can blow it or pop it away. Or to blow away to calm any anger

they decided after looking at the conventions on the rights of the child THEY SHOULD NOT have cracker strips in them, because they had learnt they had a right to live without fear!



SHARKS- "what happens when we usesharp, hurtful words?"

CHAMELEON- "feelings can change."

TURTLES (with retractable heads) "don't hide your feelings – share them"

EVERGREENS at Trinity – I try to go along to Evergreens on the 3rd Monday of the month **THURSDAY FRIENDS**- at All Saints – I also try to go along to Thursday Friends when I can, and have offered to do a light lunch on the 1st Thursday in the month.

FISHING FOR PEARLS- I delivered a series of 6 sessions, with the purpose of seeking out the pearls that we find in life as we journey through it. The sessions were "stand alone" sessions and were well attended.

We had some interesting conversations about:

- Memories
- Identity and relationships
- Wisdom
- Forgiveness and reconciliation
- Death and dying
- Celebrating life



My sincere thanks to Anne for her support and advice in delivering this, and to those who attended from All Saints, Trinity and beyond.

PASTORAL

I continue to support individuals in the community pastorally, and have been involved in much greater depth in a piece of pastoral work in the wider circuit, which remains confidential.

RELIGIOUS ORDER

Like so many deacons, I am very disappointed not to be physically going to Convocation this year, but we shall "meet" online from 4th - 7th May and then meet in a slimmed down Convocation in Telford in October provided restrictions are lifted. Our regional gathering in London was also cancelled. I have been to area group meetings as required and will be doing a piece of work with a student deacon soon. I engage in spiritual direction regularly and am blessed to have a wonderful Spiritual Director walking alongside supporting me.

ONGOING LEARNING

I attended the Preaching festival at Christ Church in Oxford last September and was blessed and inspired by the superb speakers including Rachel Mann, Steven Croft, Mark Oakley, Padraog O Tuana, and Ally Barrat and Martyn Percy.



I attended the Methodist Evangelism Conference in London as a representative of the district, the purpose of which was to tighten up the vision for Evangelism across the connexion. I participated in the Saints Alive day and during this period of lock down I have at last begun my piece of work on Judas, which I hope will produce some resources for the church.

CONCLUSION

I am truly grateful to all those within both churches and beyond who enable me in my ministry and support me and my family, and I feel truly blessed to have been invited for a further 3 years. I continue to pray for you all regularly and give thanks to God for the blessings which you bestow. May you all know His peace and love.

6. Our Circuit

The Circuit Leadership Team (CLT) comprises Rev. Keith Underhill (Superintendent) – Wantage, Childrey, Grove Rev. Ian Griffiths – All Saints, Trinity Rev. Jocelyn Bennett – Wallingford, Didcot & Milton Deacon Selina Nisbett Alan Smith Anne Matthews Carolyn Mary Hancock Geoffrey Maunder

6.1 Finance

The Circuit's financial position is sound. The Accounts for 2018/19 were approved by the Independent Examiner and a budget for 2019/20 was set which enabled the Circuit to go forward with a range if initiatives.

6.2 Staffing

The Circuit is delighted that Deacon Selina Nisbett has accepted our invitation to serve with us for a further three years. She has an important and inspiring mission with us and we are blessed indeed in her desire to stay in our Circuit. It is, however, with sadness that we record that Revd Jocelyn Bennet, having suffered from intermittent ill health for some months, began a period of extended sick leave early in 2020. Arrangements for the pastoral care of the churches in her charge have been made, and we pray for her recovery and restoration to us.

The year also sees the start of a further stationing process for Revd Keith Underhill and Revd Ian Griffiths, both of whose current appointments end in August 2021. That process was to have begun with a District Briefing Day on 16 May 2020, but see section 5 below for the present position.

6.3 Initiatives

In connection with the 60th Anniversary of All Saints Church, a District one day conference was held at All Saints on 5 October 2019 with the title 'Saints Alive!' The meeting was addressed by Revd Trey Hall, British Methodism's Director of Evangelism and Growth and was a well-attended and successful event.

A second Inspirational Circuit Meeting was held on 24 February 2020 at Didcot Church, and was addressed in a thought-provoking fashion by the Vice-President of the Conference, Professor Clive Marsh, on faith and contemporary culture.

The first event in what is intended to be a programme of activities around mental health was held at Wantage Church on 15 March 2020, and was addressed by Revd Steven Normanton, a Methodist Minister and founder of the mental health charity Peer Talk on the subject 'Breaking the Taboo'. And, although this is not strictly a Circuit initiative, it should be recorded that no less than 17 young people from our Circuit attended the national youth event 3Generate in Southport in November 2019.

The Community Chaplains scheme based at Great Western Park has continued to flourish but it was disappointing that despite two rounds if advertising it did not prove possible to appoint a third employed Chaplain to the project.

6.4 Appointments

It is gratifying to record the appointments of Liz Wood as Circuit Meeting Secretary and of Debbie Adams as Circuit Safeguarding Officer, and to thank their predecessors, Gill Skidmore and Tabitha Griffiths for their outstanding service in recent years.

6.5 The Virus.

And then it all stopped- or at least that is how it seemed at the time. The lockdown was established, our churches were closed, and all meetings cancelled. The reasons for these draconian actions were well understood and wholly accepted, but nevertheless, they posed challenges. What does a church look and feel like when its members can no longer meet together? Our churches set up ways of keeping in contact through the pastoral visitors. The video-conferencing software 'Zoom' was discovered and regular Sunday morning services are offered 'hosted' by our Superintendent Minister. There were 83 participants in the 3 May service, which shows clearly how popular they are. Our people send emails to each other and call on the phone, just to ask 'how are you'?

At the time of writing (early May 2020) it seems that we are surviving, both metaphorically and literally, since we are not aware of any Covid-19-related deaths among the Circuit's membership. But important events have had to be cancelled- for instance, the District Synod at which the major report on Marriage and Relationships was to have been considered, and the event arranged at White Horse Hill for June 2020 to mark the 200th anniversary of Methodism in our area (and in connection with which the ready co-operation of the National Trust, on whose land the event was to be have been held, should be recorded with great thanks). Stationing will go ahead, but without the District Briefing, and in unprecedented circumstances.

But the questions crowd our minds. What about contact with those of us who are not part of the digital world? What will the effect on our finances be? When and under what conditions will church services resume? Just what will the 'new normal' look like? How many furloughed workers will have no job to return to? The virus is very far from having gone away: will it return? There are as yet no answers to these questions. Our faith is challenged but remains strong. We believe in the love of God for ourselves and for the communities in which we live. We have no magic wand, but the Circuit is here to serve the churches and their people as best it can, both in the very difficult present, and in the days to come.

7. Church in Abingdon



Although I offered to replace Paul as the representative for All Saints in February and attended their AGM that month, I have yet to have that role formally agreed by a church meeting. In the meantime, we thank Brian and Paul for their contributions to the workings of The Church in Abingdon Governing Body over many years.

The last eighteen months have seen the loss of two much-loved Abingdon clergy – Ruth Baker of the Quakers and Ed Evans of

Abingdon Community Church - both of whom were dedicated to the work of the CiA and the Abingdon Community. They will be greatly missed. Clergy appointments have included Phil and Kath Cooke as permanent assistant ministers at Christ Church, Michael Ivey as Assistant Pastor to Abingdon Community Church and Captain Alexandra Devine to Abingdon Salvation Army.

As pressures on clergy increase, attendance at their regular fellowships has decreased and many of the newer clergy are unaware of the importance of The CiA in Abingdon church life. This has meant that the plans of some individual churches have been allowed to impinge on regular CiA events such as Lent Lectures, while some churches have duplicated community activities. The Chairmanship of CiA currently rotates, making co-ordination even more difficult. Nevertheless, the bond of Christian fellowship in the town has ensured that the life and work of the CiA has continued both in the worship, mission and ministry of our individual congregations and in our life together. Over the last year, activities have included:

- Inter-church communications via monthly clergy meetings, CiA news and Christian Focus
- Free children's activities and church information point at Fun in the Park
- An Alpha launch in September and various Alpha courses across town.
- The Michaelmas Fair Service attended by over 80 people
- The Annual Bereavement Service at Trinity
- Children's activities during The Abingdon Bonanza
- Pre-election Hustings (in conjunction with Abingdon Chamber of Commerce)
- Midday Prayers, United Service & Quiz to mark Week of Prayer for Christian Unity
- Lent lectures on Matisse, by Revd Charles Miller
- Services for World Day of Prayer, using materials from Zimbabwe.

In addition, members of the churches have work together to represent faith in action through projects including: 35 Ock Street; TAB; Street Pastors; Christian Aid; Church Twinning; Desire; TrinintyLearning; Prayer Spaces and APP.

All the member churches have paid into a central fund, which has awarded grants to:

- The Abingdon Bridge £2000 p.a. for their work with disadvantaged young people
- DESIRE youth network £1000 p.a. to help run schools weeks and larger events
- Abingdon Street Pastors £1000 p.a. to fund their ongoing help for people out at night
- Experience Easter £750 p.a. to help schools explore the Easter story
- 35 Ock Street £500 p.a to support a meeting place for church and town
- Back to 35 £150 p.a for providing a place for retired people to meet
- Thrive South Abingdon £1000 p.a. for outreach to young people in the c ommunity

The highlight of the year was the District meeting 'Saints Alive' that was initiated by Mission Action and held on Saturday 5th October when the principal speakers were Rev'd Trey Hall, the Connexional Director of Evangelism and Growth, and Rev'd Jill Marsh, District Mission Enabler. The meeting was strongly supported by All Saints people and the attendance included many people from the Circuit and District. Mr Hall preached at the morning service on 6th October and afterwards entered into a conversation about outreach with our congregation after a Church Lunch. He challenged All Saints to reach out more energetically to its local community. The preacher at our 60th Church Anniversary on 3rd November was Rev'd Canon Helen Cameron, the Chair of the Northampton District. After the service, the congregation followed the preacher on to the grass at the front of the church where she dedicated our new Cross and Signage. Mission Action sees this as an important contribution to our outreach to the local community and is delighted with it. After the Dedication, the District Chair joined us for a church lunch after which she engaged in conversation about our mission with those present.

Mission Action had another meeting planned for late February 2020 but, unfortunately it had to be postponed due to Deacon Selina being unavailable due to ill health. Then, plans to meet fell foul of the Corona Virus lock-down. Mission action has organised two Mission initiatives for 2020. On Sunday, April 26th our morning service was to have been led by Libby Harkness-Smith, one of the Circuit's community chaplains working on Great Western Park estate, Didcot and on the weekend of 12/13 September, we will welcome Rev'd Gwynethh Owen to lead an Overseas Mission, weekend.

Mission Action strongly supports All Saints' 'Loneliness Initiative' and is concerned to present Thursday Friendship which it sees as a potentially strong contributor to this initiative.

- d. Re-felting the toy shed roof: this came off in the storm. Alastair offered to do this, with Bob and David P. Bob will get materials.
- e. Outside noticeboards: The size of the boards and whether planning permission would be required will need to be looked into.
- f. Redecorate Hall?: this hasn't been done for 3 or 4 years. It would probably cost around £1,000 to be done professionally. As we still have some paint, it was agreed that the lower part could be cleaned down and painted.

3. Fire Detection System

Two quotes have been obtained for an automated fire detection system throughout the premises, but costs would be in the region of £15,000, plus costs of removing asbestos from the Perry extension ceilings. PA has recommended to Church Council that no automated fire detection system be installed at this stage. Uniformed organisations cannot at present organise sleepovers, but after consultation they will prepare an activity Risk Assessment for sleepovers, which will be submitted to our insurers and the fire brigade for approval before sleepovers resume. Other activities in the Church are adequately covered by our existing fire precautions and practices, according to our fire consultant.

4. Pre School Lease

At its October 2019 meeting Church Council asked PA to look at preparing a lease for Pre School, as they had requested one. Under Methodist Church guidance, we are forbidden from granting leases since this gives tenants exclusive rights over the space they use. Methodist guidance is to issue only an annual licence. This is effectively what already exists through the annual issue of our Booking Conditions. However, an annual licence has been issued in the past to Pre School, signed by both parties and including adherence to the Booking Conditions, but this practice lapsed some many years ago. In order to resume we need agreement with the central Methodist Church, and this is being sought with Manchester via Finance Committee.

5. Solar Panel installation

Quotes have been obtained for solar panels to be installed on the Church Hall roof – A paper detailing the costs, benefits and layouts will be discussed at next Church Council

6. New Chairman needed from 2021

David Perrow will chair the next meeting in October 2020, but will not continue as Chair beyond that. Members were asked to give some thought as to whether they could take over, or whether there were others outside the Property Action group who could be approached to join PA and Chair the group.

9.10 Tubb House Group

The publication of "God in Love Unites Us", saw the Group embark on a detailed study of this document where we shared frank opinions. These opinions were summarised in a brief report to the Church Council.

During 2019 we joined in the C in A Lent Course on the Beatitudes, where the teaching of Jesus was contrasted with the attitudes and ideas of twenty- first century society. We were encouraged to show in our lives what Jesus expects of us, in contrast with many aspects of modern society.

Lent 2020 saw Dr. Charles Miller presenting a series on Matisse, the controversial artist, and his work in relation to his religious beliefs. Sadly, Covid 19 brought the series to an abrupt end.

During the All Saints' Jubilee we produced a tile showing a photo of the Group in session and reminding people that the Group has continued for over 40 years!

10. Other Church Activities

10.1 Christian Aid



During the Christian Aid accounting year 2018-19, ending in August 2019, the total raised in Abingdon across all activities was £9,507, excluding Gift Aid. This was a little lower than the previous year. Funds raised

in May during Christian Aid Week were down about 23%, on the previous year's total but, thankfully, a number of additional events through the year enabled the loss to be almost recuperated. During the week a total of £5,201 was raised with All Saints contribution to this being £1,584 through house-to-house collecting in Abingdon and Radley. Many thanks, as ever, are due for the efforts of our stalwart group of collectors. The annual New Year sponsored walk raised a total of £1,211 which was down on the previous year. As usual, other events to promote Christian Aid and its work worldwide took place throughout the year including a Lent Lunch at Abbey Baptist

Chapel on Clubs and Societies Day, a Tin Shake outside Tesco Extra and a Summer Concert given by Abingdon Ladies Choirs and Abingdon Gospel Singers. We are always most grateful for the support given to Christian Aid by All Saints members and friends, through attendance at meetings, collecting outside Tesco, singing carols, walking at



New Year and the Market Place Sale. We would especially like to thank all those who made the effort to knock on doors for the House to House Collection during Christian Aid Week.

Needless to say, given the continuing need of the world's poorest people and the growing impact of climate change on these poorest of communities, we shall certainly be seeking your support in the coming year despite and because of the present pandemic. Time will tell what the impact of the current health concerns across the world will be on the poorest countries. It is, however, certain that their health services, basic community hygiene facilities and food supplies will continue to need the support of agencies such as Christian Aid. Please do try to contribute to appeals from Christian Aid as it tries to meet the emergency needs of the poorest as well as continuing its ongoing long-term projects.

catholic hosts, so we were delighted when several visitors accepted our invitation to join All Saints' evening communion service. Others shared bread in the twinning service, as they joined in a reflection based on The Remember Me workshop of Experience Easter.

Balancing availability of hosts with that of visitors is often difficult, and the numbers visiting Argentan for their Heritage Weekend in September 2019 were very small. A good time was had by all and a lovely wreath was presented during the morning service, in memory of the suffering experienced by the town in August 1944. Details of the visit were explained in an illustrated talk to All Saints' Friendship Group.



Abingdon's United Service for Week of Prayer for Christian Unity focussed on the work of Church Twinning and Christian Aid, with the offertory being divided between them. Thanks to this, a small grant from the Town Council, fundraising events and sales of a new Christmas card, we now have some funds to enhance our visitors' experiences. We continue to try to develop links with Lucca and Colmar.

Our 2019 walk was a huge success. Our walk was around the Isle of Purbeck We had another beautiful day for the second annual walk in the isle of Purbeck, nearly 70 walkers from all over the UK walking between 1 and 20 miles and ending with a pasty supper. It was great fun for all. The 2020 walk has become the 2021 walk, a circle of eight around Woolacombe.

I have gladly relinquished the post of Chair but remain a trustee.

FPZ trustees were fortunate to be involved in the London Marathon 2.6. Unable to take part in an exercise sponsorship myself I made 26 face masks in an African fabric which have been eagerly received by Mayott House.

At present the school, Skills Centre, Secondary & Tertiary students have all been suspended However, the vital feeding programme is being continued by our teachers, taking food parcels to the vulnerable children's home.

The need in Zambia is just as great and probably will be more so when normality returns. FPZ wishes to thank all the people at All Saints who give

their support so generously. Please continue to pray for our administrator, cooks, teachers, tutors and learners at this difficult time.

10.6 The Nasio Trust



The NASIO TRUST has had a very successful year.

Marie Hooper, who is working part time, alongside Nancy, now fills Louise Russell's role when she left to go on maternity leave in December, giving birth the Arlo in February.

Esther, one of our first 20 children at St Irene's (when the mud hut school opened in 2007) finished her National Examinations for Form 4 secondary and scored high enough grades to be accepted at Medical school in September 2020. Meanwhile, before the COVID school shutdown she has been volunteering to work on Nasio projects.



In 2019 Nasio received a grant towards a project called One Acre Farming. With the closure of the nearby Sugar Factory many farmers lost their livelihood of selling cash crops. The project was to encourage them to farm food for family consumption with a soft loan for fertilizer and weekly training sessions. The project attracted 150 local people using their compounds for food growing. For Nasio the benefit has been less children to feed on the supplementary feeding programme and improved community health. For the start of 2020 the number of applicants exceeded 500.

Another pilot programme in 2019 that has been refunded to continue in 2020 is the Peer Educators programme. Many teenagers were experiencing mental health issues. The culture of silence and repression of feelings did not enable them to discuss emotions felt about their parents deaths and issues like teenage pregnancy or find out about family planning or sexually transmitted disease. I was lucky enough in September to meet Viola, aged 18, who had been on one of the initial these two week courses and had turned her life around and returned to school.

In late November 2019 the Kenyan Government department for Health finally awarded Nasio's George Mudneyo Clinic the hospital status that had been applied for some 18 months earlier. We were thrilled that, through prayer and patience, this had been achieved without the need for a bribe.

Most recently our efforts have been working with the Ministry of Health to educate the poorest communities, especially those living in the Mumias slums, around COVID -19 issues of hygiene. Tippy taps have been erected and following their education gifts of soap have been given. All mothers delivering babies at our medical centre have also received sanitisation instruction before being discharged.



Please continue to pray for the ongoing work with the poorest of communities in rural Western Africa where Nasio operates as it endeavours to extend its support to even more vulnerable and needy children and guardians within the community. The need will be great once schools are allowed to return to normal after the curfew.

10.7 TrinityLearning



Spring 2019 was spent delivering several of our regular activities at Carswell School. A group of Year 5 pupils met the Abingdon Morris Men and researched Summer activities in Abingdon, before publishing their edition of Hello Abingdon, and Year 6 enjoyed a Peace Zone within their classroom during SATs. In November, our staff and volunteers provided Prayer Spaces for Remembrance, to help

children of military families through difficult times. Peace is a central concept in our work, so we were delighted to work with Abingdon Peace Group to provide every school in the area with a Peace Pack, with teaching resources and ideas for Peace Week in September. The pack included a competition for students to produce art-work on the theme of Peace, won by All Saints' Junior Church. TrinityLearning's small singing group have become an established part of Kingfisher School's life, featuring in their OFSTED report where inspectors noted "pupils using music and movement to develop their sensory skills, taking part with enjoyment and confidence."

Throughout the year, volunteers have been hard at work at Kingfisher School, renovating a derelict garden area. With funding from Tesco's Bags for Life and the help of Beavers, Adventure Scouts, volunteers from local industry, and a regular group of boys from Radley College, volunteers from All Saints have provided a beautiful sensory garden for staff and pupils. Children attending through the lockdown have enjoyed a delightful space bright with newly planted flowers, shrubs and imaginative decoration. We look forward to the time when all the children are back in school finding peace and pleasure in tranquil, creative settings.



It's also been a year of growth and change, as we developed all the policies required by our new charitable status, and Rosemary spent vital last months before her retirement handing on as much information as possible to our new Education Officer, Nicola Willliams. In September we celebrated TrinityLearning's achievements and its newly acquired charitable status at an event in Trinity Church attended by many of our valued volunteers and friends, as well as the Mayor of Abingdon, Councillor Charlie Burke. Rev'd Ian Griffiths made the presentation to Rosemary congratulating her on all that had been achieved in her ten years in post. In September came the appointment of Tamzin Round, the Education and Development Co-Worker to assist Nicola with projects in schools and in January another 'Nicola' joined the team as Administrative Assistant who is giving welcome back-up with the many office tasks required by the new charity. Among these are writing policies and preparing grant applications, all of which are very time consuming.

The expanding team reflects TrinityLearning's desire to develop its muchneeded work, offering new projects as well as helping more children. In September the first training session for volunteers interested in Thinking Books took place. Under this scheme emotional support is now provided for some children who lack confidence and who may have other difficulties. It is about more than learning to read. The books are carefully chosen describing characters in situations which offer the reader opportunities to recognise and talk about feelings. It is hoped by this means to develop their emotional development. Conversations with their teachers at this early stage suggest that there is evidence of progress. Nicola is now an approved Safeguarding trainer, enabling volunteers to meet the requirements of the schools we support.

TrinityLearning is immensely grateful for the generous support from both the central Methodist and URC churches, which have contributed to the cost of salaries during our status change, and to ongoing support from local churches. TrinityLearning could not exist without your volunteering, prayers and financial support.

10.8 Karibuni Trust



This year marks the twenty fifth year in which Karibuni Children (previously Karibuni Trust) has been operating in Kenya, bringing food and education to children who are the "poorest of the poor." Plans to mark this notable milestone ranged from a celebratory meeting

of supporters in July to various events centred on the theme of "Twenty Five". Sadly, the arrival of Coronavirus has meant that all those plans have had to be cancelled. Yet there is still so much to celebrate and the impact of the Coronavirus pandemic has demonstrated what is so special about the charity.

Providing a nutritious lunch to it's 700 sponsored children and students is a key priority for Karibuni Children. Their parents or guardians often depend on obtaining day to day casual work without which there may be little or no food to eat. With the closure of Kenyan schools and colleges in the face of the virus, those nutritious lunches were no longer available. At the same time casual work dried up. Within a few days of hearing that news Karibuni Children had provided emergency grants to projects so that they could issue food parcels to parents and guardians and had launched an appeal to its supporters to help to finance the extra costs of providing such assistance in the coming months. The response from supporters was immediate and generous, such that further grants covering subsequent months were made. Throughout Karibuni has worked closely with the excellent project staff in Kenya who have been responsible for distributing the food. George Mwabu, who runs the project at Tharaka, commented: "Congratulations Karibuni

Children for bridging this gap. Smile below the masks of the poor and vulnerable".

John Cotton, Chairman of Karibuni Children has added: " We are most grateful to the members of All Saints who both collectively and individually have supported our work over the past year."

I can then arrange to re-stock the storage boxes so we don't run out.

One outcome from Future Focus was an increased awareness of the need for All Saints to consider how it communicates its message – both internally, between ourselves, and externally, to the wider community.

As a result, Ian convened a small group of people to consider new approaches. We met for the first time in December, and discussed a range of topics. These included:

- the foyer
- AV issues
- advertising
- a newsletter
- house style/Methodist branding.

Obviously we can't tackle all of these at once!

We made a start by obtaining some large posters displaying our regular service times; these were supplemented by a colourful poster advertising the special sermon topics in Lent.

We have also seen the first few occasional Newsletters, covering topics of more general interest than can be covered in the weekly notice sheet. These have so far been produced entirely by Ian, but other contributors are beginning to come forward.

The biggest change has been in the foyer. The entrance provides people's first impression of All Saints; in the case of parents collecting children from meetings, it may be their only point of contact. It was last revamped around 30 years ago!

There are plans being developed for a reorganisation and change of furniture, but our initial thoughts were to develop the noticeboards. These were already clear and business-like, but organised according to our internal processes and committees. The new version uses a colourful background which looks warm, bright and welcoming. The labels all use the Methodist orb to tie them together, and the labels themselves identify sections in terms of ministry rather than committees: 'Exploring Faith' for housegroups, services and special events; 'Opportunities to Serve' for rotas and vacant posts, etc.

In response to Margaret Ellwood's decision to stand down as Webmaster we discussed the refreshing of the website. Keith Underhill came and demonstrated the Circuit and Grove websites, and explained the importance of regular updates and new content. This is all under consideration, and we hope to be able to move forward soon with a new team to take over from Margaret.

10.13 Future Focus -

Combatting loneliness and All Saints – why it's about connection and community.

Have you ever felt lonely? Maybe there's been no-one when you've needed to talk, maybe you've felt disconnected from the world, left out or misunderstood. Or maybe a life event has left you with an overwhelming sadness. Whatever the cause, loneliness is everywhere, affecting any and all of us at some point in our lives. Nearly half of all 65+ in the UK report TV or pets as their only company (Age UK, 2015). A startling enough fact, but statistics show that young people (16 to 24 year olds) are the loneliest. Amongst other risk factors for loneliness are losing a partner, having poor health, or having little sense of belonging (Community Life Survey, 2017).

Following the Future Focus Day in March 2018, All Saints committed to doing something about it, and formed a 'Combatting Loneliness' initiative. We recognised that we knew little about how to tackle the issue appropriately, so invited the Archway Foundation to give us training. Having learnt some tips, formed some strategies and established a Review Group, the Church Family and Pastoral Committees set to work.

So far, here's what we've achieved...... We've learnt that a personal approach is the most helpful in making connections. Last year, we organised a Coffee Morning and Book Swap, sending personal invites, and encouraging everyone to bring a friend. This year, we have held a series of Conversations led by Deacon Selina, touching on loneliness, exploring our experience of the second half of life – pastoral visitors sent invites to all. Looking ahead, we are organising a Jo Cox More in Common 'Coffee Morning and Big Bakery' event at All Saints on Saturday June 20th, (but under review due to social distancing.) The idea was inspired by our recognition that the Referendum debate had caused divisions nationally and locally. The Church Family Committee hope to involve the local North East Abingdon community by invitation, to demonstrate that we can come together and help to restore any lost feelings of belonging.

The Combatting Loneliness initiative will ultimately succeed or fail depending on one thing – YOU! Speak to someone you don't know; visit where you know there's a need; get involved in a church activity as a way of connecting; be vigilant for signs of loneliness in anyone. We can only do this together – one church, in the community, making God's love real – once it is safe to do so again!

10.14 Diamond Jubilee Celebrations 1959-2019 60th Anniversary



Given the current circumstances, the Diamond Weekend to mark All Saints 60th Anniversary last November seems ages ago, but as I write, it is not even six months since we had that wonderful weekend:

A quiet meditative service on Friday, All Saints Day marked the start and then there was an almost full day on Saturday with a coffee morning and a great collection of photos taken at memorable occasions to remind us of the many blessings that All Saints has witnessed and shared over the years.
